Submit your order 14 days in advance.

Temporary Ostomates

Fees must be paid for access to the Stoma Appliance Scheme (SAS).

They should be paid by the second month after surgery.

Products may be held until payment has been received.

If payment presents a difficulty, Members should contact WAOA, as instalment arrangements can be made.

Fees are payable by July 1st each year.

Membership Fee

Membership Fee for 2024/25:

- Full Member: \$90
- Concession Member: \$80

These fees are payable to WAOA before you receive products from the Stoma Appliance Scheme (SAS)

Payment is due before 1 July each year.

Order Additional Stoma Supplies

If you are using more products than usual for some reason, you need to be reviewed by your STN (or GP) to find the cause and ensure the correct products are being used. They will be able to complete an application form for additional supplies. The form Application for Additional Stoma Supples-Clinical is available from your STN, WAOA HQ, or the Human Services website:

www.humanservices.gov.au/organisations/health-professionals/forms/pb050

Once completed the form is valid for up to six months.

Members must organise a review with an STN or GP before the form expires if additional products are still needed. We suggest you mark this date on your calendar as a reminder.

You must indicate the extra supply needed when you place your order.

Postage

Your Management Committee has had to increase the cost of postage to the flat rate of \$12 per parcel from October 2024.

This is a break-even rate and will be reviewed again in June.

Express parcels will remain unchanged.

NB: To make the most of your postage, double orders are encouraged. However, there are a few exceptions:

- If you haven't had your stoma for 6 months yet and it is still changing size/shape
- you're still trying to find a product that works for you
- your next STN review may cause you to change products
- you're anticipating reversal of your stoma shortly

Holiday Supplies

- Members going on holidays can order a double supply in advance
- If you are travelling to other parts of Australia, you can order supplies from other Australian Associations using your member number if necessary. Ostomy Australia's national magazine has a Directory of Ostomy Associations
- For travel periods overseas longer than two months you must provide a copy of your itinerary with travel dates clearly identified with your supplies order. Up to six months of supplies can be ordered this way
- WAOA has a travel brochure transcribed into several languages describing what an Ostomy is which you may find helpful for security screening at overseas airports
- WAOA cannot send products overseas.

Reversals

If you have been given a date for your reversal:

- Arrange to see your STN before going to hospital for the procedure
- Consider if you need to order a full supply of products? Perhaps you need less stock?
- Make arrangements to notify WAOA after your procedure has been completed
- Return any unused products to WAOA
- Help can be given for your return to nostoma status

Postage

To help reduce our administrative time, please consider making payments for several orders at a time.

Headquarters' Update

I am writing this half-way through October so well into spring and contemplating Christmas "just around the corner". Mine will be enjoyed quietly as usual, and I trust yours will be enjoyable too.

Postage

As you may be aware we have had to increase the cost of each parcel to \$12.

Survey

At the time of writing, we have had no feedback on the Dept of Health and Aging's survey related to the distribution of products on the Stoma Appliance Scheme. Business as usual!

Your ordering

"Order what you need - and use what you order" remains our request. We still need that 2 weeks' notice for your order because we live on this side of the continent!

Don't be anxiously awaiting your next delivery, but neither have more than a month's supply in reserve (we have had another LARGE stockpile returned). Protection of the Stoma Appliance Scheme is everyone's business, so please check your storage area before ordering each time.

Product changes on the Stoma Appliance Scheme (SAS)

On a regular basis, suppliers can offer new products to be included on the SAS (over 3,600 now), or request products be removed because these are no longer viable to produce or they have developed an improved version.

A rigorous assessment process is undertaken by a specialist panel which includes an experienced ostomate and Stomal Therapy Nurses before permission is granted. Such permissions see changes and affected ostomates are usually notified by us. If help is needed for you to accommodate any change, please make an appointment with your STN – don't just groan!

WAOA AGM - was held on Saturday 30th November

The Association is travelling well overall. The increased annual fee to our overarching Australian Council of Stoma Associations (ACSA) which is responsible for the computer program under-pinning our functioning, security and the introduction of a Member Portal for improved ordering has meant that Membership fees may need to be increased for the 2025/6 year. Increased STN support has also been an additional investment for members' benefit.

Raising Awareness of Living with a Stoma

- STN Tania has requested member participation with activity photos see her report on pages 18 20.
- A video of an alternative management option for people with a colostomy has been made and posted on our website, along with the other information videos at Useful Links -Western Australian Ostomy Association Incorporated - Colostomy Irrigation (waostomy.org.au)



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Albany Support Group Update...

The President, Gerry van der Wal, opened the meeting in the Albany Free Reformed Church Hall at 1:30 pm and welcomed all present. There were 9 members present with 1 spouse attending as well, and we again welcomed our STN, Rachael.

One of our members put in his apologies for non-attendance by text from Birdsville, Queensland, where he was travelling across the Simpson Desert en route to Canberra on holidays. He shared with us that the 47 degrees temperature up there caused his seals and bags to fail catastrophically as a result of the heat and sweat. He drove on with a towel wrapped around his middle, resulting in a wet and smelly mess. He contacted the Albany STN, Rachael, by satellite phone, and she was able to provide a few suggestions that finally enabled the bag to stick to his skin for a longer period of time. He wrote that it was a very unpleasant situation, but the desert and the night sky and campfires made up for it! Good on you, Tony!

Our STN Rachael interacted with Tony's text message, informing us that there were products for purposes, and that the bags and seals that performed perfectly okay in the cooler weather experienced in Albany, were not designed to continue sealing efficiently in temperatures of 40 degrees plus. She encouraged members to consult with her if they were considering undertaking a trip similar to Tony's, or even if they had concerns about activities such as deep-sea diving or vigorous exercises that could possibly cause their bag to spring a leak. She was aware of how different seals could perform differently under differing circumstances and was prepared to research and advise on the most appropriate seal and bag for the particular situation required.

She also encouraged members to become familiar with how long their bag could remain attached before problems occurred, but not to leave it too long, and regularly change before a leak developed. She explained that different seals suited different skin types as well, so she recommended members to experiment with the various seals available to see which one worked best for them. Obviously, if their particular seal/bag combination worked well, then members should stick with that.

This resulted in an exchange of experiences; it was interesting to note the differing lengths of time that members were changing their bags at, with some changing every day whilst others able to keep their bags attached for 5 or more consecutive days without any problems. Two days was probably a happy medium.

Members also commented that travelling to Bali, for example, posed no problems at all, but it obviously did present a totally different scenario to 40 plus degrees in the Simpson desert, as activities in Bali revolved around relaxing in a pool, which meant that skin temperature would also be a lot more comfortable and less likely to adversely affect the adhesive qualities of the seal/bag combination.

Our STN then gave us a presentation on the desirability of having a stoma first aid kit when experiencing a problematic stoma. She displayed several items that would be valuable additions to such a kit, including barrier spray, stoma adhesive paste, stoma powder, and a range of extensions to increase the surface area of the adhesive coverage, to enable the member to increase their stoma adhesive efficiency, or in the case of an emergency to make do until a proper change could be made and/or STN support and advice could be sourced.

Her presentation and input was again very much appreciated; it is great to experience that she is also keen to make this a regular feature of our meetings.

The meeting donated the sum of \$32.60 to the kitty, bringing this up to a current total of \$139.70.

Coffee and cake and socialising was enjoyed again by all afterwards for what had been another relaxing and enjoyable and informative meeting.

Our next meeting is scheduled for the 6th December, same time same place, all things being equal.

WA Ostomy Association's recent survey found a notable interest among Ostomates in receiving professional psychological support. This finding underscores the importance of psychological support as a crucial, yet often an overlooked element in both pre- and post-operative care. Ostomates face unique physical and psychological complexities. As both a psychotherapist and an Ostomate, I am committed to providing specialised psychological support tailored to the needs of Ostomates.

A Personal Journey and Professional Expertise

As an Accredited Psychotherapist and Mental Health Social Worker, I am dedicated to bridging this psychological gap in Ostomate care. My professional background in Psychotherapy includes extensive work in hospital social work, counselling, family systems therapy and managing mental health and NDIS services within government and various cultural community settings. This experience has equipped me with a comprehensive understanding of the complexities Ostomates and their caregivers face, both medically and psychologically.

My personal journey is deeply intertwined with my professional expertise. With over 20 years of lived experience as an Ostomate, I understand firsthand the physical, emotional, and psychological complexities that accompany life when living with chronic health issues and adapting to life with a stoma. Realising that specialised psychological support and genuine understanding for Ostomates was lacking motivated me to address this gap. This personal insight informs my practice, ensuring that I provide informed, compassionate support tailored to each individual's unique circumstances promoting wellness and recovery. Wherever you are on your journey, know that support is available, and you do not need to face things alone.

Holistic and Effective Therapeutic Approaches

I emphasise a trauma-informed, person-centered approach, ensuring that every client feels respected, understood, heard and supported. I use evidence-based therapies such as Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) to help reframe negative thought patterns, Acceptance Commitment Therapy (ACT) to embrace life's challenges, Mindfulness practices to encourage presence, and Dialectical Behaviour Therapy (DBT) to support emotional regulation. These approaches are tailored to help you navigate challenges ranging from adapting to a new lifestyle to managing chronic health conditions.

Creating a Safe and Supportive Environment

I create a safe space for Ostomates and their caregivers where you can openly explore concerns, fears, and aspirations without judgment. Whether you're a child or teenager navigating identity formation, a parent or an older adult adapting to the complexities of life with a stoma, I am here to provide compassionate guidance and effective therapeutic strategies. Referral Process

- Referrals are accepted directly from individual Ostomates or their caregivers, WA Ostomy Association, Stoma Nurses, GPs, or treating teams. Please call or email to make a referral or an appointment.
- Counselling is available for children aged 5-14 with a guardian present. For clients aged 14-16, sessions can be held with guardian consent. Those 16 and older can attend sessions independently.

Funding and Fees

• <u>Fees</u>: As a Mental Health Accredited Service JIWA Wellbeing has a Medicare Provider Number, entitling clients to Medicare Rebate under a GP Health Care Plan. Other funding options include Private Health Insurance, Department of Veterans Affairs funding, the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS plan-managed), or privately funded at \$150 per session.

Session Availability

- Counselling sessions are up to 55 minutes.
- For accessibility, counselling sessions are provided online, via a secure platform, or by telephone.
- Sessions are available Monday or Thursday, between 8:00 am and 6:00 pm.

Connecting with you to bring hope

ACCESS CARDS

Did you know that when you become an ostomate you are given a disability toilet access pass card?

The card identifies you as someone who requires urgent access to a toilet due to a medical condition.

These cards authorise Members to use Disabled Toilets in public places and can be shown if your use of these toilets is questioned.

Ostomates sometimes report being challenged as they enter or leave a disabled toilet because they don't look like the wheelchair logo displayed on disabled toilet doors.

Hopefully, this card will help you respond to such a challenge.

On reflection it has been a productive year for the STN service at both the headquarters and rurally.

The full-time hours continue to be well utilised with the Monday to Friday STN clinics. Our survey earlier this year of over 600 ostomates demonstrated a high level of satisfaction with the care received when having accessed our service which is reassuring to know that we are meeting our ostomates' needs.

We are continuing to provide education to our medical students with another education session provided to the UWA 4th year students in September and we are looking forward to hosting more year 3 students from Curtin next year.

Lorrie and I attended the Aboriginal Health Conference in August (see picture below) which was again so useful/interesting and enlightening. As with many of our conferences that we attend its an opportunity to network with other services, meet new and existing Health Care Professionals to reinforce the work that we do and services that we offer to our Indigenous ostomates.

Lorrie and I attended the keynote speaker session by Mechelle Turvey who is 2024 WA Australian of the Year. Mechelle was given the award following her work to prevent violence and improve the treatment of victims of crime having lost her son who died after being attacked on his way home from school.

It wasn't the loss of her son that Mechelle spoke about during her session it was how she cared for her husband who died of cancer around the same time. Mechelle didn't know her husband had cancer until she answered a call for him to change an appointment time from the hospital. I can only imagine what it would feel like to lose a child and a husband in such a short space of time but to make something positive out of these tragedies is awe inspiring.

Are you drinking enough water?

As the weather heats up here are some tips for the prevention and management of DEHYDRATION in adults* -

It is important that you have a well-balanced diet and adequate fluid intake to maintain your body's hydration balance i.e. > Fluids lost from the body = fluids taken into the body

Fluid losses: Urine, Water vapour from breathing, Stool, Sweat (visible and invisible) Fluid gains: Drinks, Foods

What is dehydration?

- A condition where fluids lost exceed fluids taken into the body
- Can be mild, moderate or severe (life-threatening)
- Some essential salts will also be lost in these fluids

Causes:

High temperatures, Heat exposure, too much exercise, Vomiting / diarrhoea, Urine infections, Diabetes, Insufficient fluid intake, Some medications (especially diuretics)


For people with stomas:

- Removal or bypassing of the large bowel reduces the body's ability to conserve water from the stool
- Stoma output that exceeds 1 litre in 24 hours








Inaugural Clinic

STN Recommended Use of Accessories

As you are no doubt aware by now the government is evaluating our Stoma Appliance Scheme to look at ways to reduce costs. The government spends approximately \$22 million a year on accessories alone - these are the products that we use in addition to your appliances.

We find that many are not using the accessories as they are intended or using unnecessarily. Our mantra is less is best for your skin so the least amount of product used the greater benefit to your skin. Often, we see ostomates who develop sensitivities to products when used over a long period of time. Gentle cleansing with warm water and a soft cloth such as a chux is sufficient and better still taking your bag off in the shower as long as you don't have any open wounds.

Please see below for the correct usage of products and if in doubt see your STN for advice.


